

Carteret Waterfront Subject of Monmouth University Case Study

Five prestigious universities recently participated in the 2024 Kislak Real Estate Institute Challenge, an annual redevelopment competition hosted by

Monmouth University.

This year, the case study was to redevelop a portion of the Carteret waterfront situated between the forthcoming Carteret Intermodal Transportation Building, the hub of the Borough's forthcoming ferry service, and Carteret Stages, a movie studio and hotel planned for nearby. Villanova University won the \$10,000 first prize, while Monmouth University took second. Princeton University, Rutgers University, and the University of Baltimore also participated in the Challenge.

"Monmouth University's Kislak Real Estate Institute is one of the most prestigious and reputable real estate schools in the country," Mayor Daniel J. Reiman said. "We are honored that they chose Carteret's waterfront as their case study. I have enjoyed looking at all the plans and wish the students well in what likely will be very successful real estate careers."

Students were provided with a project map that included public access to the waterfront, a tax map, and Borough population demographics and income figures.

For the past five years, which is a little more than half of the Challenge's tenure, Carteret planning con-

sultant Andrew Janiw of Colts Neck-based Beacon Planning has been writing the case studies.

Monmouth wanted to utilize the Carteret waterfront as a case study because movie studios are such a hot development topic in New Jersey, Janiw said. "Plus, there's the ferry," he said. "Villanova did a

"Plus, there's the ferry," he said. "Villanova did a wonderful presentation with great graphics. They gave a practical solution to the question. The judges look for the practicality of the response and the ability for the vision to have a foundation something that actually can be viable. The key is to not give us a crazy vision but to give us something sustainable."

Raised in Carteret, Janiw also served as one of the Challenge's seven judges of real estate, banking and legal professionals. A frequent guest lecturer at the Kislak Real Estate Institute and a member of its curriculum advisory committee, Janiw will be the recipient of the Institute's Service to Industry Award at its annual dinner on May 30 at the university. Donald M. Moliver, the retiring founder of the Institute, will receive its Leadership Excellence Award.

The Kislak Co., the İnstitute's namesake benefactor, is a family-owned redevelopment firm founded in Woodbridge and now based in Florida. Carteret Receives \$4.1M DCA Grant for Bergen St. Bio-retention Facility

he Borough is surrounded by two major rivers: the Arthur Kill and the Rahway River. While they make for wonderful waterfronts, the public access to and redevelopment of which continually increase in Carteret, flooding can be hazard.

To help mitigate that in one of the most vulnerable parts of the 5 mile-square Borough, the Department of Community Affairs has awarded Carteret a \$4,107,675 Resilient Communities grant. The funds will pay for most of a \$4.7 million bio-retention facility on flood-prone Bergen Street, Mayor Daniel J. Reiman announced.

"We're very grateful to Gov. Phil Murphy and his administration for these funds to help manage storm water run-off and prevent flooding among the many multi-family and single-family residences on and near Bergen Street," Mayor Reiman said.

Bergen Street is located near the Borough's southern connection with the Arthur Kill Tidal Strait. Storm water run-off there drains directly into the Arthur Kill via a drainage trench.

Due to the high volume of impervious services in the surrounding area and its proximity to the coastline, Bergen Street experiences flooding during heavy rain and major storms. To address this flooding, the bio-retention facility will be built on the former site of three apartment buildings.

"The structures were severely damaged during Hurricane Sandy and would have required substantial improvements, including being raised, to avoid

future flooding," Mayor Reiman said.

The project will include the resurfacing of Bergen Street, addition of a storm bypass pipe, construction of a detention basin and surrounding pedestrian pathway, plantings that will assist in retaining and cleaning storm water, and dry flood proofing of the existing Bergen Street sanitary sewer pump station.

The proposed bio-retention facility will catch, clean, and temporarily store storm water run-off from Bergen Street and the area around it, which will improve water quality and reduce the risk of flooding. Once the storm water has drained through the subsoil, it will be directed into drainage pipes that lead into the Arthur Kill.

Carteret Scores Blockbuster Hit with \$4.7M NJEDA Film Studio Grant

New Jersey Economic Development Authority recently approved a \$4.7 million infrastructure grant for a waterfront redevelopment project, Mayor Daniel J. Reiman announced. The \$1 billion 10-acre project includes a 1.2 million-square-foot movie pro-

duction studio complex.

Five grants totaling \$9.5 million were awarded throughout the state as part of NJEDA's Film and Digital Media Studio Infrastructure Program. Nearly half of the funds went to Carteret to construct public access to a former brownfield site, as well as utility infrastructure for the dozen 20,000-square-foot sound stages, post-production facility and studio

offices Bezzone Inc. is developing.

"The Carteret Stages film studio project will be an absolute game changer for Carteret and the redevelopment of the brownfield site," Mayor Reiman said. "We are extremely grateful to Gov. Murphy, NJEDA and its executive team led by Tim Sullivan, for this financial support in building Carteret Stages. This and many other approved and envisioned projects will transform the waterfront into a regional destination and will coincide with our forthcoming ferry service."

Previously Gov. Phil Murphy stated, "Following my reinstatement of the Film and Digital Media Tax Credit program and game-changing investments in our rapidly expanding film and television industries, production has exploded in the past four years as more people learn what New Jersey has to offer. This huge growth has fueled thousands of jobs for New Jersey residents, while providing economic benefit to our towns and cities."

Assembly Speaker Craig Coughlin said, "I'm so pleased to see this strategic investment in Carteret's future by the EDA. The borough is poised to capitalize on the rebirth of the New Jersey film and media industry. This grant will provide valuable resources to update and expand vital infrastructure that will spur economic growth and add to the already-rich cultural landscape in the region."

Project developer Joe Bezzone added, "The film industry began in New Jersey with motion picture camera and viewer inventor Thomas Edison's Black Maria Studio before the industry moved out to Hollywood, so it's great that the state government is so

supportive.'

The access roads, Waterfront Boulevard and Lighthouse Way, will permit access through the site to the parking lot and parking structure of Carteret Stages, as well as numerous developments planned for the vacant lot where the studio will be constructed.

Future attractions connected or in proximity to the Carteret Stages will include a hotel, restaurants, retail, and the Carteret Intermodal Transportation Building, the bustling hub of the Borough's forthcoming ferry service.



Carteret Stages, a \$1 billion waterfront redevelopment planned for 10 acres of a former brownfield site in Carteret, recently received a \$4.7 million grant from New Jersey Economic Development Authority's Film and Digital Media Studio Infrastructure Program to build public access roads and utility infrastructure.

"The construction of the infrastructure needed to support the Carteret Studios, as well as the construction of the facility itself, will be a significant undertaking and will create a significant number of union construction-related jobs and permanent positions within the film and television studio," Mayor Reiman said. "These high-paying jobs have the potential to drastically increase the quality of life for residents within Carteret and across Middlesex County."

The construction of Carteret Stages is expected to create about 500 construction-related jobs and 2,500 permanent film production and studio operation jobs within the Borough, Bezzone said. Permanent jobs will include stagehands, production and sound designers, film crews, as well as facility support staff. These job opportunities not only will attract new residents and commuters to Carteret but will also support employment within the local community, the developer said.

Carteret Stages has received site plan approval from the Carteret Planning Board and the proposed project site plans are shovel ready, Mayor Reiman said.

The Film and Digital Media Studio Infrastructure Program supports strategic economic development investments in the film and digital media industry. The program provides grant funding to municipalities, counties, and state entities for infrastructure improvements and site work in support of the development of a film or digital media studio production facility.

The other grant recipients are Jersey City, Egg Harbor City, and East Brunswick.

Carteret Ferry Project Receives Another \$5M in State Funding



A \$5 million grant from the state Department of Community Affairs will help construct the Carteret Intermodal Transportation Building, the forthcoming hub of the Borough's ferry service that also will feature restaurants, retail and more.

The Borough has received a \$5 million grant for the intermodal ferry terminal project from the state Department of Community Affairs, Mayor Daniel J. Reiman announced.

The ARP/SFRF funds will be used for improvements along the Carteret waterfront, including the construction of the Carteret Intermodal Transporta-

tion Building.

"This is truly an exciting time for Carteret," Mayor Reiman said. "We're very grateful to Gov. Phil Murphy for his help in transforming our waterfront into a future transportation hub and destination," Regarding the Carteret ferry project, Gov. Murphy previously said, "The state is proud to make this smart investment in mass transit that will benefit existing and new Carteret residents. Funding our transportation infrastructure has been and will continue to be a priority for our administration."

The Reiman administration has secured more than \$60 million in federal and state grants, including several competitive funds, such as a 2022 FTA grant and a 2023 Congressional appropriation.

Carteret Intermodal Transportation Building will


provide access to several forms of alternative transportation, Mayor Reiman said. Carteret Ferry Service will transport commuters to and from the World Financial Center Pier and the Midtown Terminal located at 39th Street, while also available will be a Borough jitney service, NJ Transit bus service, and bicycling.

"The new ferry terminal not only will facilitate a new affordable public transportation service but will also support the continued post-COVID economic recovery of the Borough of Carteret by spurring economic

activity," the Mayor said.

Also featuring restaurants, retail, office space and more, the Intermodal Building is part of a larger multi-year, \$1.5 billion plan to transform Carteret's waterfront. The overall vision for the site includes miles of open public access waterfront along the Arthur Kill, the construction of two commercial docks along with infrastructure to support it; the construction of a 1.2 million square-foot film production studio; 150,000 square feet of ancillary retail and hotel space; and completed construction of both a \$47 million marina next door to the project site and dredging for commercial port activities.
