





### CJMC at Carteret's Ronald G. Rios Pavilion Celebrates Opening

The Ronald G. Rios Pavilion of Central Jersey Medical Center at Carteret has been dedicated in honor of Middlesex County Commissioner Director Ronald G. Rios, who has been a resident of the Borough for over 50 years. The pavilion of the West Carteret health care facility was dedicated to the Commissioner Director on Friday, Sept. 27, 2024 with an opening celebration and ribbon-cutting ceremony.

A longtime service provider in Central New Jersey, the comprehensive, yet affordable Central Jersey Medical Center recently expanded to Carteret this

year.

"Director Rios' accomplishments reflect a lifelong dedication to improving the quality of life for all people through effective, efficient and dedicated public service," Mayor Daniel J. Reiman said. "Central Jersey Medical Center's expansion into Carteret displays a desire to help as many in our region as possible."

Originally established as the Jewish Renaissance Medical Center, the federally qualified health center

opened in Perth Amboy in 2001.

Founding Executive Director Jack O'Leary said he was excited about dedicating the satellite medical center to Director Rios because he's an outstanding leader.

"That's what you need in government today," O'Leary said, "someone who understands the people he serves. That's one thing I can say about Ronnie: he's a good

listener, and he gets things done."

Assembly Speaker Craig Coughlin added, "It is truly fitting to have a place named after him while he's still here to be celebrated and hear all of the things that we all have to say. Ron makes a difference. This building and the services it provides will make a difference. I look forward to all the things that CJMC does."

In a letter read by Mayor Reiman, Senate President Nicholas Scutari said he was grateful for Director Rios' "tireless commitment to this project and the vision you brought to make this a reality here in Carteret for the residents of Middlesex County. I have no doubt that this new medical center will provide much-needed access to health care for your residents and help ensure your community is better equipped to meet its medical needs. Thank you for your hard work and commitment to the people of Carteret, Middlesex County and the State of New Jersey."

Director Rios has served on the Middlesex County Board of Commissioners since 2008. He was

appointed Commissioner Director in 2013.

Prior to that tenure, Director Rios served for many years on the Carteret Borough Council, including as Council President from 2003 to 2008. He also worked for more than 30 years for Conrail, during which time, he held many offices for the Oak Island Local 6965 Transportation Communications International Union AFL-CIO, including as president for 10 years from 1993 to 2003.

"To the board of directors of the Central Jersey Medical Center and the Jewish Renaissance Foundation for this dedication of this brand new stateof-the-art medical center in my beloved hometown of Carteret, I'm truly humbled by this honor," Director Rios said. "If you told me 50 years ago when I first moved to Carteret, there would be a medical center or any building for that matter dedicated in my name, I'd say you're trying to pull a fast one on me, and you're crazy. Today is a dream that my parents could never have imagined for the Rios family name when they moved here from Puerto Rico. It's a dream that I couldn't conceive as a blue-collar worker all of my life and a public servant on the Carteret Borough Council for many years and for the past 16 years on the Board of County Commissioners, a job I dearly love.'

Central Jersey Medical Center's services are vast ranging from primary health to dental to preventive

services.

As a federally qualified health center, CJMC opens its doors to everyone who is in need of medical care whether they can afford it or not, O'Leary said.

"That's the truth of a federally qualified health center," he said. "We don't turn people away. We make sure that they're being taken care of on a medical basis. We consider ourselves a medical home where people not only come here when they're sick but are receiving the care that keeps them healthy each and every year."

In addition to the speakers, dignitaries at the dedication ceremony included councilmen Vincent Bellino, AJ Johal, Jorge Diaz, and Randy Krum, Middlesex County Democratic Chairman Kevin McCabe, County Clerk Nancy Pinkin, County Surrogate Claribel Cortes, and South Amboy Councilwoman Zusette Dato.







The Borough of Carteret, New Jersey, is now offering registration for slips at the Carteret Municipal Marina, which just opened this past spring. The Marina, located along the Arthur Kill River at Carteret's beautiful Waterfront Park, 200 Middlesex Avenue, features 185 slips, 38,000 square feet of floating docks, gas and diesel fueling stations, sanitary pump out, deepwater port, and a 17-foot draft.

Slips are offered at competitive pricing - the lowest along the channel in the region. Carteret residents are offered even lower rates. Slip contracts and registration are available online for seasonal, annual, or short-term rentals at <u>Carteret.net/Marina</u>.

# Carteret waterfront to receive more than \$4M in improvements



Carteret Waterfront Park is under reconstruction with recreation and landscaping improvements (1 & 8), including a new surface for the miniature golf course, not pictured within this concept plan of the improvements; expansion of synthetic turf picnic areas (2 & 4) and walkways (5); a 24-by-32-foot band stage (3); a Pier Pavilion (6), a three-season outdoor restaurant on Veteran's Pier, and a new pre-fabricated restroom (7).

The Borough continues to improve its waterfront with many new projects, Mayor Daniel J. Reiman announced.

More than \$4 million in improvements are underway at Waterfront Park partially paid with \$1,573,000 in county funding. They include:

• A Pier Pavilion, a three-season outdoor tiki bar and snack stand on the southern end of Veteran's Pier next to the Municipal Marina in a spot that doesn't conflict with local fishing areas

• A new pre-fabricated restroom building to replace the existing tank restroom, including water, electric, and sanitary sewer connections

Expansion of the picnic areas and walkways

• 24-by-32-foot band stage pad, including new electric service

• Recreation and landscaping improvements, including new surfaces for the miniature golf course

and putting green.

Park improvements will be done by Elizabeth-based Arco Construction Group. Work is expected to be completed by March 30, Arco said. Funding includes a \$1.5 million Middlesex County Open Space Grant and a \$73,000 Local Recreation Improvement Grant from the state Department of Community Affairs. Additional funds came from the Borough of Carteret Open Space Trust and the 2024 Municipal Capital Budget.

"My administration has worked to turn Carteret's coastline into a pristine destination from what once was an environmental nightmare abandoned by industry," Mayor Daniel J. Reiman said. "We went after those corporate polluters to provide the first public access to the Arthur Kill in 100 years. We will continue to improve the waterfront, crafting it into the top-notch public destination and recreational area it deserves to be."

Near future waterfront improvements include:

• A 25-foot mobile kitchen in Waterfront Park that soon will go out to bid and will serve food and beverages from spring to fall, particularly at such popular events as the Carteret Independence Day Festival, Carteret Latin Fest, and the weekly summer-long Concerts by the Bay series

• A 2.5-mile Riverwalk to the north and south of Waterfront Park starting at Noes Creek, continuing to the border of Port Reading and currently under

construction

Additionally, the Borough is in the planning stages of adding an abandoned rail line that runs parallel to Peter J. Sica Highway and to the waterfront to make a 5-mile loop around Waterfront Park, Mayor Reiman said. Last year, the state Department of Transportation awarded the Borough a \$1.5 million grant for this Carteret Waterfront Multi-Use Pathway Project.

In essence, we would create this five-mile Rails to Trails-to-boardwalk concept," the Mayor said. "We're grateful to NJDOT for their support of our continued efforts to turn our former 'chemical coastline' into a recreatioal destination, not only with the forthcoming Riverwalk but also Waterfront Park, Veteran's Pier, and a marina."

# Carteret Receives Federal Funds for Public Safety Technology

Mayor Daniel J. Reiman recently announced that U.S. Rep. Frank Pallone (D-6th) has secured \$1.2 million in funding from the U.S. Department of Justice's Community Oriented Policing Services to significantly enhance Carteret's public safety infrastructure.

The COPS Technology Grant will provide local police with thermal-heating drones, security cameras, laptops for patrol cars, emergency 911 call boxes to improve public safety and emergency response coordination, and pole-mounted license plate readers.

"I like would to thank Congressman Pallone for his unwavering commitment and support to the residents of Carteret and to all of our emergency service departments and personnel," Mayor Reiman said. "Carteret is a diverse urban community with nearly 26,000 residents and hosting major port infrastructure, the New Jersey Turnpike, rail, pipeline, manufacturing and critical energy infrastructure supplying the continental Northeast. With many redevelopment initiatives and vast improvements to nearly every sector of our local community and local economy, we have called upon Congressman Pallone's assistance and support for a broad range of initiatives.

"Today's funding announcement represents a pivotal investment in the safety and security of every person in our community," the Mayor continued. "With these funds, we will be able to equip our police department with cutting-edge technology that will significantly enhance their ability serve and protect. From advanced security systems to sophisticated license plate readers, and the integration of the newest policing technology, these tools will provide our officers with real-time intelligence that will allow them to respond faster, more efficiently, and more effectively. This investment is not only about strengthening law enforcement; promoting a vision for a safer, more connected community. These technologies will serve as a powerful deterrent to crime and will give our citizens greater peace of mind, knowing that we are equipped to handle the challenges of modern public safety.

The proposed enhancements are designed to improve situational awareness, expedite emergency response and enhance the overall security measures implements by Carteret's police and fire departments. With Carteret's proximity to the New Jersey Turnpike, industrial facilities, and vital coastal port infrastructure, these upgrades are not just beneficial but essential, Congressman Pallone said.

"The strategic placement of emergency call boxes and advanced technology will significantly improve the capabilities of our local law enforcement agencies," the Congressman said. "By putting money into these upgrades, town officials can deliver faster responses and better teamwork during emergencies, all to keep our community safer and more secure."


During the 2023 and 2024 appropriations process, Congress Pallone was instrumental in securing \$1.6 million in funds that will be used to relocate and upgrade the Carteret Office of Emergency Management and Emergency Operations Command Center, Mayor Reiman said. The forthcoming state-of-the-art facility will combine multiple locations and take advantage of modernizing an underutilized existing borough building while improving the ability to respond to emergencies, the Mayor said.

In November, the Borough received a \$625,000 competitive grant from the COPS Hiring Program to hire five new police officers.

"With the demands of law enforcement being greater than ever, these investments will make a clear statement: we are committed to empowering our officers with the tools and resources they need to succeed," Mayor Reiman said. "By embracing innovation and technology, we are creating a safer, more secure environment for our families, our local businesses, visitors and the future of our community."

"We are excited to continue the growth of the exhibit to







Hawthorne-based The Nitro Blues Band won \$1,500 from the Carteret Battle of the Bands on Sept. 18. The band plans to invest their winnings into the forthcoming release party at Clifton VFW Hall for their debut EP.

The winner of the annual Carteret Battle of the Bands is The Nitro Blues Band, a young four-piece steeped in the roots of rock that also influenced The Rolling Stones, The Allman Brothers Band, Cream and Led Zeppelin.

The band's prize from the Sept. 18 contest was \$1,500, which they plan to invest into their soon-to-be-announced debut EP release party at the Clifton VFW Hall.

Nitro Blues Band is vocalist-guitarist Patrick Graham Mellor, guitarist Armaan Gupta, and the sibling rhythm section of drummer Tony and vocalist-bassist Bella Grande. Hawthorne Bandshell.

"My mom sent the Carteret Battle of the Bands to me on Facebook messenger, and the prize money was good," Mellor said. "We're pretty confident in our ability as a group. It felt great! Massive anxiety relief."

The young bluesman said he got turned onto the genre by punk and garage bands he liked, as well as a guitar teacher.

"I was really into punk rock and old garage rock like MC5, The Clash, The Stooges," Mellor said. "The more I read about them the more they credited blues artists. Then my first guitar teacher, Chris Burnett, showed

me some surface level stuff, Muddy Waters, B.B. King, cats like that. Then I have just been digging deep into the blues ever since."

Coming in second at the Carteret Battle of the Bands was last year's winner, Carteret-based Latin rockers Rioz, who took home a \$1,000 cash prize. Third place went to Union veteran punk trio The Accelerators with a \$500 prize.

The Carteret Battle of the Bands is sponsored by Carteret Business Partnership, the Borough's nonprofit economic development corporation and special improvement district, and organized by Central Jersey Arts Council, which hosts regular programming at Carteret's Blazing Star Cultural Arts Center. ### Biz Profile: Exit 12 Mexican Bar & Grill

Danny Martinez, owner of Exit 12 Mexican Bar & Grill, wanted to open a Mexican restaurant in Carteret because during his youth and young adulthood, the Bronx native of Latin-Caribbean descent spent a significant amount of time in Mexico.

The culture, food, people and music made a big impact, Martinez said.

"I felt connected to it and wanted to bring that vibrant experience back to my now hometown of Carteret, where I could share it with my community and give locals a cool spot to eat and have a drink," he said. "I spent some time analyzing Carteret and the demographic, and I felt this would touch all cultures so I have a bit of food for everyone. I really enjoy Carteret and hope to be here and grow.

"What I love most about Mexican food is the depth of flavors," Martinez continued. "The simplicity of ingredients combined with the complex layers of taste is truly something special. The culture is rich with traditions, vibrant colors, and a strong sense of community. Mexican drinks, like the Cadillac Margarita, are smooth, refreshing, and perfectly complement the food. # Carteret WWII Veteran Remembered for Leading Capture of Nazi Fort

he family of Carteret World War II hero Capt. John Markowitz recently reunited to celebrate the 80th anniversary of the liberation of Saint Malo, France, from Nazi occupation.

The celebration took place in August at The Military Technology Museum of New Jersey in Wall. A large display of the German naval flag the Markowitz-led Company K of the 329th Infantry Regiment captured was the centerpiece of a museum exhibit dedicated to the liberation of Saint Malo.

The 38 men of Company K signed the 5-by-7-foot Nazi flag they captured, and several of their families from throughout the tristate area also participated in the anniversary exhibit. For the display, Markowitz's niece Lyn Rutkoski researched and wrote profiles for all 38 of the Company K soldiers.

"I thought it was great that everything worked out,"

Rutkoski said.

"It was an amazing presentation," added nephew John Markowitz, who was named after the war hero. "It took my breath away."

Some Company K family members came all the way from Colorado to see the flag, said Rick Wark, assistant director of the Military Technology Museum.

Of the 38 men who signed the flag, 34 survived the war. Markowitz was among the four who later were killed in action. Markowitz died on Oct. 6, 1944 in Echternach, Luxembourg. He stepped on a landmine while doing reconnaissance.

"John Markowitz's parents owned a bar in Carteret," Wark said. "After they signed the flag they captured at Saint Malo, Markowitz sent the flag home to his mother, who hung it in the bar for a month or so until he was killed. His mother couldn't accept that, and she wanted the flag out of the bar. So it went to the local firehouse."

Representatives of the West Carteret Firehouse donated the flag to the museum.

Saint Malo was a major Nazi surrender in the wake of D-Day a couple of months earlier, Wark said.

In Saint Malo, the Nazis had created a stronghold within a fort that was surrounded on three sides by the sea. The only way Company K could attack it is across a narrow bottleneck of land with 500 yards of open ground to traverse before the wall of the fort was reached. The open ground was heavily fortified with trip wires, anti-tank obstacles and mines. The whole area was under fire from heavy caliber naval guns and from closer guns on the waterfront.

Under Markowitz's command, Company K fought back savagely, eventually capturing the fort and

liberating the town.

Markowitz was 1938 graduate of Carteret High School, a parishioner at St. Demetrius Ukrainian Church and a member of its basketball club. He then graduated from the University of Alabama with a degree in education. He was also part of the ROTC and upon graduation in 1942, entered the U.S. Army as a first lieutenant.

The signed Nazi flag and accompanying mural the museum created is displayed four times a year, including Veteran's Day Weekend, which is coming up Nov. 9 and 10. The flag also is available to groups upon request of an appointment at 732-280-3000. Museum hours at 1-5 p.m. Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sundays.

Mary is a life member of the VFW Star Landing Post No. 2314, held offices as president of the Slovaks Citizens Ladies Club and vice president of the General Stephanic Slovak Club, and helped grow the local Altar Rosary Society from 6 to more than 100 members.

Christmas Eve is legendary at Mary's house, where nearly 100 family members and friends gather to enjoy her holiday cooking, including Santa Claus. Mary's collection of 4,000 Santa Claus figurines has captured news media attention and is visited by Carteret school children for whom she bakes cookies and hands out Santa lollipops.
